Timeline: Age 16

- **Photo Health Card** by age 16
 - New card with picture and signature required
 - o If the student is unable to sign or have his/her a picture taken, a <u>Health Card Medical Exemption Request form</u> can be completed by a family doctor.
 - o Renewing Your Photo Health Card
- Register with **DSO** (Developmental Services Ontario) at age 16
 - <u>Developmental Services Ontario Eastern Region</u> (DSO-ER)
 - o DSO Online Application
- Social Insurance Number
 - Social Insurance Number overview
- Obtain an Ontario Photo Card at age 16
 - Ontario Photo Card
- <u>Student Links</u> is a ministry funded mentoring program for student with intellectual disabilities to explore ideas about their future after secondary school.

Timeline: Age 17 ½ - 18

- Open a **Bank Account** by age 18
 - Direct deposit information for ODSP
 - Investigate opening an RDSP (<u>Registered Disability Savings Plan</u>)
 - Available at most banks
- Apply for ODSP (Ontario Disability Support Plan) four months prior to age 18
 - Applying for ODSP Income Support
 - Online Application for Social Assistance
 - Some benefits may include:
 - community bus pass,
 - health benefits, such as prescription drug coverage, vision care & dental
 - disability-related benefits, such as help to pay for hearing aids
 - employment incentives and benefits, such as help to pay for child care costs or items you need for work
 - housing-related benefits
- Initiate change to **Adult Health Care** by age 18
 - Medical <u>Health Care Connect</u>
 - o Dental
- Disability Tax Credit transition at 18
 - o PDF application form: <u>Disability Tax Credit Certificate</u>
- Parent and caregivers may wish to begin **Estate Planning** and establishing a **Henson Trust** to ensure the student will not be disqualified from ODSP and can still benefit from an inheritance.
 - Funds held in trust information from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services
 - o Finding a Lawyer or Paralegal in Ontario
 - Legal Aid Ontario
 - o Providing for a Family Member with a Disability
 - o Community Living Estate Planning Guide (a 'must read')

Timeline: Ages 20 to 21

- Develop a post-secondary plan with the support of <u>Service Co-ordination</u> case worker. (Worker is assigned after completion of the DSO application process.) Some programming to investigate may include:
 - Ottawa-Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OCAPDD) Day programs: <u>Life Program</u>, <u>LOEB</u>, and <u>Quinlan</u> (Vanier & Nepean)
 - Ability First Ottawa adult skills training, A.R.T. in Action, professional mentors, housing assistance, summer camp (All over Ottawa)
 - Adaptive Learning Program (ALP) prepares most students for job placements and/or volunteer opportunities. (Albert St.)
 - o Bairn Croft activities (Orleans)
 - <u>Christian Horizons</u> community participation, employment services, supported independent living, community residences https://www.citizenadvocacy.org/(Walkley and Conroy Area)
 - ABLE2 (formerly Citizen's Advocacy) <u>Matching Program</u> 1:1 matching program, Independent Facilitation and Person-Directed Planning, <u>Personal-Direction - Planning and Facilitation</u>
 - Destiny's Way three <u>Adult Day Programs</u>: Awareness and Well-Being, Life Skills, and Digital Arts (Merrickville)
 - EARN (United Way) connector between employers and service providers with a goal to help increase employment opportunities to people with disabilities.
 - The Good Companions Adult Day Program on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays (Albert St.)
 - Main Street Community Services Adult Day Program (Stittsville)
 - Innovative Community Support Services Adult Support Programs: Sow & Grow and Spread the Joy (Orleans)
 - <u>Live Work Play</u> independent living supports, employment supports (with ODSP), and supports with pursuing personal interests, activites, and/or learning
 - o <u>Partners in Parenting</u> Life Skills (<u>LIFE</u>) and Leisure (<u>ACE</u>) day programs (St. Laurent Blvd)
 - o Sonshine Families <u>RAYS Day Program</u> and <u>BEAM Days Program</u> run Monday to Friday
 - <u>Tamir</u> <u>Day program</u> that emphasizes recreational and leisure activities, life skills development and volunteer options for the individuals who attend. (Carling & Broadview area)

- Total Communication Environment <u>Community Integration & Day Supports</u>, outreach (Nepean)
- Ys Owl Maclure Co-operative Centre <u>Learning Centre</u> and <u>Owl Employment</u> Program, <u>Supported Independent Living</u> independent living supports (Nepean)
- <u>Causeway Work Centre</u> Employment Supports Program (ESP), Job Quest, Solutions for Youth (up to age 29), as well as <u>Social Businesses</u> operated by Causeway (Hintonburg)
- Lunch Ability "Out and About" program offering monthly outings and a nutritious meal
