Timeline: Age 16

• **Photo Health Card** by age 16

- New card with picture and signature required
- If the student is unable to sign or have his/her a picture taken, a <u>Health Card Medical Exemption Request form</u> can be completed by a family doctor.

Social Insurance Number

- Social Insurance Number overview
- Apply for VHA Health & Home Care support for the attendant services outreach program.

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- Register with **DSO-ER** (<u>Developmental Services Ontario Eastern Region</u>) at age 16 if the student has a developmental disability or a mild intellectual disability.

- Obtain an Ontario Photo Card at age 16
 - Ontario Photo Card
- <u>Student Links</u> is a ministry funded mentoring program for student with intellectual disabilities to explore ideas about their future after secondary school.

Timeline: Age 17 ½ - 18

- Open a **Bank Account** by age 18
 - Direct deposit information for ODSP
 - o Investigate opening an **RDSP** (Registered Disability Savings Plan)
 - Available at most banks
- Apply for **ODSP** (Ontario Disability Support Plan) four months prior to age 18
 - o Applying for ODSP Income Support
 - Online Application for Social Assistance
 - Apply for <u>ODSP Employment Support</u>
 - Some benefits may include:
 - community bus pass,
 - health benefits, such as prescription drug coverage, vision care & dental
 - disability-related benefits, such as help to pay for hearing aids, wheelchairs and wheelchair repairs
 - employment incentives and benefits, such as help to pay for child care costs or items you need for work
 - housing-related benefits
- Initiate change to Adult Health Care by age 18
 - Medical <u>Health Care Connect</u>
 - Obtain a Medical Summary Report from Primary Care Provider
 - Ensure specialists have started making referrals to adult care
 - Review Advanced Directives documents
 - With support from Primary Care Providers, develop an emergency plan for admissions to hospital after 18 years.
 - Dental
- Disability Tax Credit transition at 18
 - PDF application form: <u>Disability Tax Credit Certificate</u>
- Initiate change to adult ADP (<u>Assistive Devices Program</u>) authorizers by 18
 - o Book an appointment with ADP authorizers for an assessment.
 - Funding assistance may be available through:

- The War Amps
- Parents and caregivers may wish to begin **Estate Planning** and establishing a **Henson Trust** to ensure the student will not be disqualified from ODSP and can still benefit from an inheritance.
 - Funds held in trust information from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services
 - Finding a <u>Lawyer or Paralegal in Ontario</u>
 - Legal Aid Ontario
 - o Providing for a Family Member with a Disability
 - o Community Living Estate Planning Guide (a 'must read')

Post Secondary Transition: Algonquin

- Student graduating with an OSSD and college level programming (ex. ENG4C) who wish to pursue Algonquin College:
 - Meet with Sir Guy Carleton guidance counselor to ensure appropriate prerequisites are taken and to apply for college programs.
 - Contact <u>Algonquin College's Centre for Accessible Learning</u> to ensure appropriate supports are in place
 - o If necessary, apply for Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP), making sure to indicate sure to indicate student has a disability as he/she may qualify for the Bursary for Persons with Permanent Disabilities
 - Find out more about scholarships and bursaries for students with disabilities at <u>Disability</u> Awards.

Timeline: Ages 20 to 21

- Develop a post-secondary plan with the support of <u>Service Co-ordination</u> case worker. (Worker is assigned after complete of the DSO application process.) Some programming to investigate may include:
 - Ottawa-Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities (OCAPDD) Day programs: <u>Life Program</u>, <u>LOEB</u>, and <u>Quinlan</u> (Vanier & Nepean)
 - <u>Ability First Ottawa</u> adult skills training, A.R.T. in Action, professional mentors, housing assistance, summer camp (All over Ottawa)
 - Bairn Croft activities (Orleans)

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- <u>Christian Horizons</u> community participation, employment services, supported independent living, community residences (Walkley and Conroy Area)
- <u>ABLE2</u> (formerly Citizen's Advocacy) <u>Matching Program</u> 1:1 matching program, Independent Facilitation and Person-Directed Planning, <u>Personal-Direction - Planning and Facilitation</u>

- o Sonshine Families <u>RAYS Day Program</u> and <u>BEAM Days Program</u> run Monday to Friday
- <u>Tamir</u> <u>Day program</u> that emphasizes recreational and leisure activities, life skills development and volunteer options for the individuals who attend. (Carling & Broadview area)
